Registered Nurses (RN) are responsible for gathering information about patients using communication, physical assessment, and analytical skills; administering medications; performing invasive and non-invasive procedures; communicating with patients and their family members, peers, and other health care professionals in an effective manner; and teaching patients and their families to promote or restore health. Nurses must respect the rights and dignity of individuals and display exceptional interpersonal skills, sensitivity, and tact with ill, injured, and suffering patients. Nurses must assume a commitment to patient care and the responsibility of life-long learning.

Application Information:

The program admits twice per year (fall and spring) at both the Alexander City campus and the Childersburg campus.

Deadline for applications and all required application documents:

Fall: February 1

Spring: September 15

Admission Requirements:

Admission requirements and procedures may change without prior notice. Please check with Health Sciences Division and/or website for updates.

In addition to the general admission requirements of the College, admission to the Associate Degree Nursing program requires:

1. Unconditional admission to the College.
2. Minimum of 2.5 GPA for nursing required academic core courses.
3. Minimum 2.0 GPA or higher at current institution.
4. Transfer students must enter CACC on a clear academic status (cumulative 2.0 GPA).
5. Official transcripts sent to CACC admissions from **ALL** post-secondary institutions attended, along with high school transcript.
6. Eligibility for English 101, Math 100 and Biology 201.
7. Official score on ACT National or Residual with a minimum composite score of 18 OR a minimum score of 58 on the TEAS test. All scores must be 3 years or newer from the application deadline date.
8. Submission of completed application for ADN Program before deadline.
9. Priority will be given to students who have completed both BIO 201 and BIO 202.

Meeting minimal requirements does not guarantee acceptance. Admission to the ADN program is competitive, and the number of clinical facilities available limits the number of students admitted. After meeting minimal requirements, applicants are ranked for acceptance using a points system based on score on ACT National or Residual or TEAS test and quality points from selected college courses. Students may be eligible to earn additional points (see program application for details.)
